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Well nearly another fortnight over and only a few more to go before the end of term. A bit scary I think!

Last Tuesday the evaluation committee met to collate the annual surveys. As you may remember these surveys were sent out to parents, staff and students at the end of last term. The areas that were surveyed were literacy and a combined community engagement and school culture. The overall feeling in the surveys was very positive and on many questions there was a high percentage of agreement from all parties.

Following are some results of the collated surveys, each newsletter we will insert a few of the findings for you to read.

<u>Literacy</u>: 100% of parents and staff and 93% of students felt that literacy was almost always an important subject to learn.

71% of parents/carers thought that almost always their child's literacy homework reflected what was taught at school. 51% of parents felt they could assist their child with completing their homework but only 14% usually thought this to be true and the remaining 28% feeling that only sometimes or rarely were they able to assist their child.

<u>Community Engagement and School Culture:</u> 100% of students, staff and parents thought that almost always or usually they were made to feel welcome at the school.

100% of students thought that almost always or usually the school would regularly praise and reward students when successful.

86% of parents/carers are almost always pleased that their child attends this school while the remaining 14% are usually pleased.

<u>Areas of Strength:</u> Majority of those surveyed felt that at the school there was a good working atmosphere where all members of the school community had excellent communication with each other.

Areas for Improvement: More parent participation in the school and the P&C was a high priority.

The P&C also met that night, although it was a very quick meeting. On the agenda was preparations for end of year presentation night and last day of school.

On the last day of school we will be holding a BBQ, please bring a salad to share, a chair to relax in under the shade of the large gum tree so we can watch the students race around the Billy Cart track (**each student needs to bring a hel-met**) with their bikes and the carts and school bikes will be brought out of storage for the day as well. We will end the day off with a water fight (**no water bombs please**).

Attached to the newsletter will be the 'Hands of Friendship' nominations and raffle tickets.

The 'Hands of Friendship' award is given to a student from both the infants and primary class each year. These students have been consistently kind and helpful to others. All parents and students can nominate one student from each class that they feel deserves this award.

The raffle tickets are for the Christmas hamper draw. The P&C would appreciate any donations of goods to add to the hamper. There is a laundry basket at the school available to receive your donations.

Last week swimming notes were sent home, at present there are still a few outstanding notes, these notes will be attached again to the newsletter, please ensure you fill out the note ASAP as we need to organise transport for the fortnight.

What parents can do at home to help their kids with reading

- Be confident that your child will learn to read. Give positive messages and involve them in everyday conversations and opportunities to read.
- Read aloud to your child. It helps them to learn about the language of books and will encourage them to enjoy books and reading.
- Read to your child in your home language if your first language is not English.
- Make reading enjoyable and talk about books, magazines and computer stories that you have read together.
- Try not to let television intrude on reading time. Make a special time for reading with your child, away from interruptions.
- Listen to your child read as often as you can, every day if possible, even if only for a short time. Give books in print or electronic form as treats and presents.

Hints for listening to your child read

- When reading together at home try to make the time relaxed, enjoyable and positive. Vary it. Read together, read to your child and take turns or have them read to you.
- Before reading, talk about the cover, the title and the pictures, and discuss what the book may be about.
- During reading, discuss what has been read up to that point and predict what might happen next. After you've finished reading with your child, talk and ask guestions about the story and the pictures.

Useful reading tips

When your child is reading and encounters words that are difficult for them, use the Three Ps technique 'Pause, Prompt, Praise' to support them.

Pause: when your child comes to a word they don't know, try not to jump in straight away. Wait and give your child time to work out the word.

Prompt: if your child successfully works out the problem word, suggest they go back to the beginning of the sentence and re-read it (to recap meaning) before reading on.

If your child has not worked out the problem word, prompt them with some quick, low-key suggestions. Say things like:

- "Try reading on for a sentence or two, miss out the difficult word and see if that helps you to work it out."
- "Look at the sound the word begins with, use that clue, and think about what may make sense here? Look at the pictures."

If prompts like these are not working, simply tell your child the correct word.

Try not to spend too much time prompting, as your child will find it difficult to maintain the overall meaning of what they are reading.

Praise: praise your child's reading efforts and successes.

Things to remember about reading

- The goal of reading is always to make sense of what is read.
- Try to be interested, supportive and enjoy the time together.
- Read with your child anywhere and at any time; don't forget that many everyday experiences provide opportunities to put reading and writing into action.
- Visit and use a library near you. Borrow books for yourself as well as for your child.
- Talk to your child's classroom teacher or the principal for further help and advice.
